channels to HQDA (DAPE-HRL) for evaluation. Recommendation must include impact on mission, safety, morale, and discipline. In addition, the request will be accompanied by documentation from the religious group governing body indicating the exception requested is an unwaiverable religious requirement and the soldier is a member in good standing.

(1) All Army headgear.

(3) Buttons; uniform, US Army or Corps of Engineers.

(4) Decorations; service medals, awards, tabs, service ribbons, and their appurtenances.

(5) Insignia of any design or color which has been adopted by DA.

b. Individuals will remove all distinctive items from unserviceable uniforms before disposing of them. Only items listed in a above are considered distinctive.

c. Insignia will be worn as prescribed in chapter 26.

1-11. Wearing of civilian clothing. *a.* Civilian clothing may be worn by all Army personnel when off duty unless the wear is prohibited by the installation commander within CONUS or by the overseas commander outside CONUS in conjunction with appendix E.

b. When on duty in civilian clothing, Army personnel will conform to the appearance standards required when wearing the uniform.

c. Hair length and styles will be worn as prescribed in paragraphs 1-7 and 1-8.

1-12. Wearing of jewelry. a. The wear of a wrist watch, identification wrist bracelet, and not more than two rings (wedding set is considered one ring) is authorized with the Army uniform as long as the style is conservative and in good taste. The wear of a purely religious medal on a chain around the neck is authorized provided neither the medal nor the chain is exposed.

b. No jewelry, watch chains, or similar items, to include pens, pencils, etc., will appear exposed on the uniforms. Authorized exceptions are a conservative tie tack or tie clasp which may be worn with the black four-in-hand necktie and a pen or pencil which may appear exposed on the hospital duty, food service, and flight uniforms.

c. Earrings or earposts of any size or shape, fad devices, vogue medallions, personal talismans, or amulets are not authorized for wear by any personnel in uniform or on duty.

1-13. Wearing of identification tags, security badges, and nameplates. *a. Identification tags.* Identification tags will be worn by all personnel
